FLASHBACK

Our April 2022 edition featured the following article on the restoration of a vintage R/C set

My interest in vintage models, old engines and single channel radio gear is no secret and has lead me to join a world wide internet group known as Mode Zero. Mainly retired gentlemen with too much time on there hands the members are reliving their youth. The group has members all round the world and the web site is a valuable source of information and exchange of what members get up to. Several members are radio Hams and have contributed several electronic construction projects for those that like to tinker. Below is an example of what the guys get up to.





This is a restored Triang
Transmitter alongside a Hep Cat
with what appears to be a Mills
75 up front. In its day this was
state of the art.

These days these sets are being restored using 2.4 r/f modules. These old sets were heavy and sat on the ground with their 2 volt accumulators and 135 volt HT batteries. Thank heavens we don't have to use valves these days!

In the 1950s the transmitter would have had this space full of batteries to light up the valves. The yellow Lipo at the bottom right does the job today. The spare space makes a useful lunch box.



The original workings have been restored. The yellow box is the 2.4 module used today.

Note the glass valve used in the original set.

Its now done plenty of flying and has proven to be a very versatile model with a wide speed range.

Bigfoot's Vector Flight Stabilization System—a built-in gyro offering three flight modes (beginner, intermediate, expert) sets it along side models with AS3X stabilisation system.

That means smoother flights, easier landings, and more confidence whether you're just starting out or pushing the limits.

It is sold as a high wing trainer for beginners but ideal for any model plane enthusiast. From weekend to seasoned flyers, the Arrows Bigfoot is more than just a plane—it offers a unique experience to model flying at a very reasonable price.

A WORD FROM DAVE

Well the cold mornings are still reminding us that the winter season is still got some time to go yet. Despite that though we have had some great turnouts at the flying field with a great range of models showing up.

Having said that though the rabbits are starting to show up with some burrowing evidence here and there. Inside the tower on the table there is a blue aerosol can for marking the holes and a squirter bottle to apply diesel around the perimeter which prevents them from returning and continuing to dig. Obviously the holes should be filled and compacted with soil at the same time otherwise model undercarriage damage is bound to happen.

The tower is soon to undergo a declutter to make room for more folding tables and better storage of the hand tools, first aid kits, heart-defrib, Club Flying Safety and Procedures Manual. etc. Umbrellas will be rehoused in either the container or BBQ shed.

There will be a road cone (if you cant beat-em join em) positioned near the tower to be used as a "no fly" indication when a model goes down and requires a search team of one or more. When in use you cant miss it, positioned in front of the pilot box. No flying during a search ensures the safety of the searchers who are normally out of sight floundering around in the scrub somewhere, but could reappear on the runway at any moment.

While our Chief Flying Instructor John Ryan is away in Aussie I will be able to continue with any flight training required, and take any trial flights with one of the club trainers if any "newbies" show up. If any members know of a friend who may be interested bring them along "to have a go", but it would be useful if I know when they might show up. (Dave Little 027 7848773).


